

DISCOVERING NEW RULES

Electronically stored information now factors into litigation.

It's 5:30 Friday night. Cold. Raining. It's been a hard week at work, and you just want to go home. Traffic on I-65 is packed. Then, a crash. The car behind you slips into your rear bumper, slamming you into the guard rail. You text your spouse, "Just wrecked. OK. Call soon." Six months later, you sue the driver who rear-ended you for damages.

Electronically stored information, which includes texting, has become its own issue in litigation. By now, most everyone in the legal industry knows that the federal and state rules have been amended to address the inundation of ESI in litigation. However, what many folks in the industry don't know is how to deal with it. ESI is overly voluminous, and calling it "cost-prohibitive" is laughable.

The Alabama Supreme Court amended the Alabama Rules of Civil Procedure, allowing for discovery of ESI in a lawsuit. These rules affect probate cases, domestic relation cases and civil cases like a car wreck case. The federal rules of civil procedure were amended in December of 2006. To get up to speed on these issues, the ESI Roundtable was formed to promote education on issues relating to what is commonly referred to as "e-discovery" and how it affects litigants.
